## GIVE US SOME RAG: CLASSROOM ACTIVITY

*Hey, Charleston! The True Story of the Jenkins Orphanage Band* tells the story of how the music genre known as rag, or ragtime, got its start. Give students a taste of this genre by tracking down and playing some rag music in the classroom. Here are a few places to start:

Play a sample of rag music for the class. Then open up the floor for discussion.

- What does this music sound like? (Fast? Slow? Quiet? Wild?)
- How is it similar to other music you've heard? How is it different?
- How does it make you feel?
- Can you hear any specific instruments? Which ones?



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Next, play another sample or replay the original sample. Invite students to get up from their desks and move around. If they feel like dancing, they should! If they feel self-conscious, you might turn off the lights or pull the window shades.

Either before or after the class dance session, show students video clips of people dancing the Charleston, the dance started by the Geechee boys in *Hey, Charleston!* Here are two links to get you started.
