Task:

Suited to small group work (2-4)

The theme of a story is its central idea. There can be one or many themes within a book. The theme is often woven all the way through the story and it is reflected in the character's actions and interactions.

Listed in the table below are some themes that you might identify in *Listen to the Moon* by Michael Morpurgo. For each, note whether you agree that this is a theme you recognise within *Listen to the Moon*. Then for the themes you agree with, make notes of evidence from the text that supports the idea.
