

# Storytime Awaits


In Make Way for Readers, Miss Bingo, the storytime rhymer, cheers:

Can you navigate the maze to find your way to storytime?




















## From FIRST to LAST






# Classroom Activity Suggestions for Your First Day of School

The first day of school is new for students AND teachers. Here are a handful of icebreaker activity suggestions to help everyone get to know each other!

#### 1. Count Your Way to School

In The Class, children all over town are getting ready for their first day of school. The story begins, "Four are eager, up since dawn. Three just sit and yawn and yawn." Ask students to track the morning of their first day of school in NUMBERS! The teacher will ask ten "yes or no" questions about their first day, and each student should keep track of how many times they answer "yes" to a question by raising their hand. Once all the questions have been asked, each student will tally up however many times they raised their hand and then tell their classmates that many facts about

themselves. Here's an example: The teacher asks, "How many students couldn't sleep and were up at dawn?" Students who answer "yes" should raise their hand and tally one (which will be one fact they will share with the class).

#### 2. Readers, Readers, Everywhere

In Make Way for Readers, a cast of animals is experiencing and sharing the fun of picture books. Here's an engaging activity for students who are getting a little antsy! Group students according to a particular type of book, such as "funny," "scary," or "exciting." Each group should come up with a skit that fits their theme and present it to the class. Then, they should each give an example of a book they've read that fits this theme.

#### 3. A Story of Your Own

In The Summer Nick Taught His Cats to Read, Nick learns that reading just the right book can make all the difference (particularly when teaching your cats to read!). Have students create their very own illustrated story. If they are having trouble thinking of an idea, have them write about their summer vacation or first day of school. Students can even pair off with one another so that one writes the story while the other illustrates.


#### 4. What Makes You YOU?


In A Tiger Tail, Anya unexpectedly wakes up on her first day of school with a tiger tail. You read that right. Not like a ponytail or pigtails. A TIGER tail. But Anya learns to embrace her very new (and very peculiar) tiger tail because it's a part of who she is. Ask students to draw a picture of one of their defining characteristics.
















## About the Books
