How might you follow these guidelines to becoming a good creature?





What can you learn from
birds? Make a bird feeder and
find out! You won't spot a
cassowary, but if you
wait patiently you just
might see and observe smaller
feathered friends—and maybe
a hungry mammal or two!

Supplies needed:

Foil pie plate

Scissors

Yarn or string

Ruler or tape measure

Hole punch

Bird seed

Instructions:

With an adult's help, use a hole punch to create three holes equidistant on the rim of a foil pie plate. Tie a 24-inch length of yarn or string through each hole and join the strings above the pie plate. Secure the strings to a tree branch, making sure the plate is level. Fill the plate with bird seed.

Sit quietly and wait patiently for birds to discover your tasty snacks. Do squirrels visit your feeder as well? **Learn forgiveness** if they spill your seeds. Remember, they are teachers, too!




Keep track of your observations and lessons learned from your animal teachers in a special *Becoming a Good Creature* mini notebook.



Cut out the rectangles and stack the pages in order with the cover on top. Staple along the center line to bind the pages together. Fold along the staple line to create your mini notebook.

Make a mobile of good teachers to hang in your room!

Supplies needed:

An embroidery hoop, a foil pie plate, or two long sticks for your mobile base

Yarn or string

Hole punch

Scissors

Glue stick or tape

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Instructions:



If you choose two long sticks for your mobile base, criss-cross them in the middle and ask and adult to help you bind them together with yarn or string. If you choose the pie plate, use a hole punch to create seven holes equidistant around the rim.

Cut out two of each image along the dotted lines and match them in sets—two

hyenas, two spiders, etc. Glue or tape your pairs of teachers together with the blank sides facing inward. You should have seven two-sided shapes when finished.

Punch a hole where indicated through both sides of your shapes. Cut varying lengths of string and tie one end of a string through each hole. Tie the other end of each string along your mobile base. Arrange your teachers at different lengths along your base.

To create a hanger for your mobile, cut three or four equal lengths of yarn or string. Attach each equidistant around the hoop or pie plate, or on the four arms of your stick base. Pull the other ends together and tie, keeping your base level.
