


Maple Syrup—the bear essentials!

Bear starts with a maple tree and ends with syrup for the pancakes for Dog and Squirrel.





It's Sugaring Time!

Bear is sharing some facts about making maple syrup.



Help Dog and Squirrel by circling the true fact in each pair of sentences.

1. It takes forty gallons of sap to make one gallon of maple syrup.
2. It takes forty million gallons of sap to make one gallon of maple syrup.
3. Sugaring time starts in mid-February and early March.
4. Sugaring time starts in mid-August and early September.

6. Sugaring season ends by early July when nights get super warm.
