

Introduction

Sometimes the issues we most need to talk about with the children and teens in our lives can be the most difficult. *We Own the Sky* by Rodman Philbrick and *Some Kind of Hate* by Sarah Darer Littman each offer unflinching looks at the ways in which racism, antisemitism, extremism, and white nationalism can take root in communities and spread, causing pain, damage, and fear to all marginalized communities. These books also ask white readers to examine their own complicity and consider how close to home this kind of hatred and violence might be.

Both of these books contain hurtful and violent language and imagery, as well as characters who espouse harmful, false rhetoric about marginalized groups of people: rhetoric that has historically been used to perpetuate terrorism and genocide. This will be upsetting and maybe even be confusing for many young readers. However, ignoring or glossing over the existence of this language and how it has been used in the past and, in fact, continues to permeate digital and physical spaces in the here and now, is not an option. These books can open the door to conversations that all adults need to be having with young people.

With that in mind, this guide includes a variety of resources including websites, toolkits, articles, books, and more that are intended to help adults understand these complex issues and provide the language and tools they need to begin the work of resisting and uprooting white supremacist rhetoric and ideology. This guide also includes a list of read-alike titles for youth and adults that examine how communities respond to violence and hatred, the history of extremist movements, and other topics explored in *We Own the Sky* and *Some Kind of Hate*.

Finally, while these books depict some truly atrocious aspects of American history, they also depict wonderful examples of the joy, resilience, and resistance found in immigrant communities and Jewish communities. It is important not just to study and understand the negative experiences and hate that have been directed at these communities but also the blessings, triumphs, and strengths these communities have experienced. To that end, this guide includes resources and readings that will provide opportunities for celebration and affirmation.

About *We Own the Sky*

A thrilling historical adventure about the rise of the Ku Klux Klan in Maine by the master of adventure himself, Rodman Philbrick. It's Maine, 1924, and Davy and Jo Michaud have been recently orphaned. Taken in by a distant relative—a famous aviator—they are now working with a group of stunt pilots who spend their time wing walking, leaping from plane to plane, and flying through fireworks! But though the stunts are dangerous, the real threat is building behind the scenes. The KKK is gaining support in Maine that summer, inspired by the racial fears promoted in the film *The Birth of a Nation*. They spew hatred of immigrants, Blacks, Jews, and French Catholics—that last, a rage that will be directed at Davy and Jo. When Davy and Jo cross paths with the Klan, they get tangled up in a terrible revenge plan and held as hostages. Can they escape with their lives?

Newbery Honor author **Rodman Philbrick** has written more than a dozen novels for young readers. In 1993, he published his first children's book, *Freak the Mighty*, which became an instant classic, and was made into a feature film. *The Mostly True Adventures of Homer P. Figg* was a 2010 Newbery Honor Book. Philbrick's other acclaimed novels include *Max the Mighty*, *The Young Man and the Sea*, *The Last Book in the Universe*, *Zane and the Hurricane*, and *Wildfire*. 

About *Some Kind of Hate*

Declan Taylor is furious at the world. After winning State as a freshman starting pitcher, he accidentally messes up his throwing arm. Despite painful surgery and brutal physical therapy, he might never pitch again. And instead of spending the summer with his friends, Declan is forced to get a job to help his family out. On top of that, it seems like his best friend, Jake Lehrer, is flirting with Declan's crush and always ditching him to hang out with the team or his friends from synagogue. So Declan ends up playing a lot of Imperialist Empires online and making new friends, including Finn, who might be just as angry as Declan. Finn introduces Declan to others who understand what it's like when the world is working against you no matter how much you try. How white kids like them are denied opportunities because others are manipulating the system. And when his new friends decide it's time to fight back, Declan is right there with them. Even if it means going after Jake and his family. But when things turn deadly, Declan is going to have to decide just how far he'll go and what he's willing to sacrifice.
